Objective of the workshop

The overall goal of the workshop is to gather lessons learned from the past studies and pave the road for future initiatives to be taken in terms of joint and collaborative scientific efforts and bring in global research insights from leading national and international experts for new ideas and direction on CCAFS research.



Background and rationale

The CGIAR Research Program on Climate Change, Agriculture and Food Security (CCAFS, www. ccafs.cgiar.org) is a major global research partnership between the CGIAR and the global environmental change community. CCAFS seeks to overcome the threats to agriculture and food security in a changing climate, exploring new ways of helping vulnerable rural communities adjust to global changes in climate. To bring more focus in CCAFS research, a workshop on "Climate Change Agriculture and Food Security: Opportunities for Regional Collaboration" is being organized in Ho Chi Minh City from 19th to 21st November 2014. This workshop will involve key partners implementing the CCAFS programs in South Asia and South-East Asia. The workshop will be attended by leading national and international experts from research, and policy planning from various regions.

A large human population, continuing high rate of population growth, and poverty characterize South Asia. The region has shown tremendous progress in last four decades in food production and availability, yet 1/4th of the world's hungry and 40% of the world's malnourished children and women live here. The region is prone to climatic risks such as floods, droughts, cyclones, heat waves; and these are projected to increase in future. Whereas, South East Asian countries has a fastgrowing population and is therefore increasingly dependent on agriculture and natural resources. These tropical countries are particularly vulnerable to the impacts of climate change. The region has already been experiencing climate change induced phenomena, which enforces the need for adaptation measures. These two regions offers huge opportunities to learn and help each other from the rich regional experiences and varied set of skills available with CCAFS researchers and partners. This workshop not only aspires to bring together lessons learned but also promotes lateral thinking, creating new ideas to point future research programs in the right direction.
